World History

Description of Course

History 10 is designed to allow students to better understand history by examining in great detail the modern era leading up to the 20th century. Students come away with a better understanding of how history unfolds and the critical impact made by individuals.

First Semester:

- 1. Review of Early Civilizations (Unit review)
- 2. the Renaissance and Reformation (Chapter 1)
- 3. the Early Global Age (Chapters 2 and 3)
- 4. the Enlightenment (Chapters 5 and 6)
- 5. the Industrial Revolution (Chapters 7 and 9)
- 6. the Rise of Democracies (Chapters 11)
- 7. Imperialism and the Modernization of Japan (Chapter 12)

Second Semester:

- 8. New Global Patterns (Chapter 13 and 15)
- 9. the Rise of Totalitarianism (Chapter 16)
- 10. World War II (Chapter 17)
- 11. The Cold War (Chapter 18)
- 12. Emerging Nations (Chapter 19~)
- 13. The Modern world we know today (Chapter 22)

This is primarily a writing course and students will learn to express their formed opinions with proper formatting, spelling and grammar. In addition, students will acquire the necessary skills for accessing information and communicating their comprehension of the material.

Further, the resources of this text frequently require students to take a position and justify it using the information in the text. They also learn test taking skills. There will be several assessments such as worksheets and activities on a daily basis, vocabulary quizzes, projects and exams.

The textbook for this course is <u>World History The Modern Era</u> and was selected because it is ideally suited for TIPS students so they can meet the challenges of upper level social studies classes.
